

A Coral Gables Haven Blends Color, Romance And Elegance



Avanzato, this house in Coral Gables was a labor of love, growing from his clients' zest for life, family and art. "It was a love relationship," Vincenzo says. "It wasn't something we did overnight — we slowly waded into the water and it flourished from there."

The owner of this 1950s-style John Volk original home wanted to turn its 13,000 square feet into a family retreat for him and his grown children. "I feel like a chameleon," the designer says. "I adapt the design to suit my clients' individual desires. It is personalized and evolves from conversations."



a youthful, contemporary design that offers ample space for both private relaxation and large-scale entertaining centered around a courtyard. Here, tropical breezes invite dining alfresco and palm-shaded beds covered with sheer curtains tempt lounging on the bayfront beach.

"The house has been in his family for years, and it had more of a classic feel to it," Vincenzo says. "It was definitely time to revamp." In the reimagined spaces of the interiors, art is everywhere, including works by Renoir, Gorky, Botero and Bravo. The owners' passion for Chagall prompted the designer's deft use of vibrant color and provided the inspiration for the ceiling mural in the family room, which gives way to a colorful yet sophisticated aesthetic.

Vincenzo also used decorative treatments to transform ordinary walls into works of art. Pale yellow glazing striated to reveal florals in mauve, green and red paints the dining room in sunny warmth. Here, a grand Louis XVI-style Cuban mahogany and metal ormolou table juxtaposes with a breakfast banquette for informal dining. Perhaps the most striking finish is found in the foyer to the family room, where Vincenzo and his artisans created a trompe l'ocil area rug based on an antique textile design in lilac, ochre and russet.

To satisfy the owners' penchant for entertaining, the living room boasts no less than six conversation groupings. A banquette and two back-to-back sofas

divide the large space into intimate units for socializing — retaining the grand scale with richly textured yellow walls, an abundance of antiques and subtle floral fabrics. "Like nature itself, the whole room is an exquisite bouquet of flowers," Vincenzo says.

The designer's masterful subtlety continues in the powder room, where he created a lighted niche inset with a gilt fretwork antique mirror against a backdrop of Venetian plaster. "It's a boudoir for the ladies," he says. And in the only departure from the home's signature palette. existing English pine paneling in the library was lovingly restored, and the bookshelves backlit to provide soft lighting in the gentlemanly space.

With the bones of the lushly landscaped brick courtyard in place, Vincenzo designed this area to highlight the owners' love of travel with Asianaccented tableware to complement their collection of Buddhist statuary. "They travel extensively and have exquisite taste," Vincenzo says. "I was shopping in London and called my client to consult. He simply said, 'Your job is to buy beautiful things, my job is to look at them." Mission accomplished.
